## Learning Activities for Summer Time:

Children should read as much as possible-do whatever it takes to make this happen!
Read to your child each day-comic strips, short books, articles, etc. Provide the materials for your child to write stories and illustrate them. Practice writing letters correctly and neatly.
Second grade requires a belt be worn to school. Please make sure your child knows how to buckle it.
Practice tying shoes.
Learn to use a computer.
Do arts and craft activities.
Learn to swim.


Go to the library and play computer reading and math games.
Avoid watching too much television or playing indoor games. Outdoor play helps children's brains develop.
Ride a bike, including wearing a helmet.
Work with numbers-which is more, less, greater, first, last, bigger, etc. Do science experiments.
Make up and tell stories.
Memorize High Frequency words from kindergarten and first grade. Make, count, add and subtract money by having a Kool-aid stand.
Research subjects on a computer.
Put on plays for your family and friends.
Watch TV with the sound off and closed captioning on, so children have to read what is said.
Eat lots of fruits, vegetables, and whole grains (oats, wheat, corn, beans.
